1. This thinker led the prosecution in the impeachment trial of Warren Hastings. He ended his friendship with his protégé Charles James Fox after declaring his support for William Pitt the Younger. This man wrote the first major text to separate the categories of the "beautiful" and the "sublime" and attacked the "abstract" grounds for a certain political upheaval in his major work. For the point, name this father of modern English conservatism, a Whig who wrote Reflections on the Revolution in France.

2. In 1950, this team signed Sweetwater Clifton, one of the NBA's first African-American players. Under coach Red Holzman, this team won their first championship after Willis Reed played through a leg injury in Game 7 of the Finals. In the 1990s, this team had rivalries with the Heat and Pacers and lost in the 1994 and 1999 NBA Finals. This team recently released Amare Stoudemire, though they are still led by Carmelo Anthony. For the point, name this basketball team that plays home games at Madison Square Garden.

Members of this party wore black cockades in their hats, and at one point were accused of treason for using "blue lights" to guide enemy warships. This party collapsed after some of its members organized the Hartford Convention.It never won a presidential election after being defeated by Thomas Jefferson. For the point, name this early political party of John Adams and George Washington.

For the point, the heartland of the Inca Empire was in what country whose modern-day capital is Lima?

This product was enriched with vitamins, sliced, and sold in American supermarkets with the adjective "Wonder." For the point, name this foodstuff that can come in pumpernickel, rye, or sourdough varieties.

For the point, name these events, which resulted in the eventual downfall of a certain empire around 476 CE. ANSWER: sacks of Rome [Chris Manners]
10. This caliphate's princes sponsored the building of Mshatta and Qusayr Amra. This dynasty sponsored a building with a notable mosaic cycle of landscapes. The Dome of the Rock was built by this dynasty's ruler Abd-al-Malik. This dynasty came to power after Hasan signed a treaty with Muwaiyah I. This dynasty was overthrown by Abu Muslim. For the point, name this dynasty overthrown by the Abbasids whose capital was in Damascus.
ANSWER: Umayyad caliphate

For the point, name this government led by Pierre Laval from a former spa town, a French Nazi puppet state. ANSWER: Vichy France [prompt on France before mention]

For the point, name this religion that is followed by a minority of the population in Myanmar and India and the majority of Indonesians.

He painted an oil portrait of the Moorish slave Juan de Pareja as a study for his official portrait of Pope Innocent X. This painter of The Surrender of Breda served as the court painter to Philip IV, during which time he included himself in a portrait of the Infanta Margarita Teresa and her entourage. For the point, name this US President who succeeded Bill Clinton.

The Chudnovsky Brothers developed the supercomputer m-zero to calculate this number using an algorithm based on one by Srinivasa Ramanujan. Johann Lambert proved that this number is irrational using the continued fraction expansion of the tangent function. For the point, name this ratio of a circle's circumference to its diameter.

He was succeeded by his Chancellor of the Exchequer, Gordon Brown. For the point, name this UK Prime Minister from 1997-2007.

One of this author's characters dies when he is hit in the throat by a musket-ball during the siege of Maastricht. This man's fictional version of John Felton assassinates the Duke of Buckingham after being seduced by Milady de Winter. The title character of another of his novels is Philippe,

22. This man's third opera is based on the life of a medieval Italian populist leader who was known as the "last of the tribunes". This composer of Rienzi took part in the May Uprising in Dresden and wrote a polemic attacking Meyerbeer and Mendelssohn called Judaism in Music. He had an opera house built in Bayreuth at which his most famous works, including Parsifal, were premiered. For the point, name this composer of The Flying Dutchman who included the "Ride of the Valkyries" in his Ring Cycle.
ANSWER: Richard Wagner [or Wilhelm Richard Wagner]

23. In Zoroastrianism, this event involves the appearance of the Saoshyant and is called Frashokereti. In Islam it is comprised of the Yawm al-Qiyamah and Yawm al-din and includes a battle between Isa and Masih al-Dajjal. Some Christians believe it includes the Battle of Gog and Magog and the appearance of the Whore of Babylon. This concept is the general subject of the field of eschatology. For the point, identify this event which, according to Christianity, may include a rapture and is described in Revelation.
ANSWER: the end of the world [accept equivalents like Armageddon, the end of time, the end of days, the cleansing of the world, the end times, the renovation of the universe, or other obvious synonyms indicating the end or remaking of things in general]

24. An equestrian statue of this man sits atop the Thunder Stone, the largest monolith ever quarried and moved by humans. This man officially founded his country's navy after capturing the port of Azov. Early in his reign, this man spent 18 months traveling incognito across Europe. When he returned, he imposed a tax on beards to promote Westernization. This man vanquished his foe Charles XII at Poltava, a victory that helped his country win the Great Northern War. For the point, name this Tsar of Russia who founded St. Petersburg.
Answer: Peter the Great [Also accept: Peter I]

25. When preceded by "National", this names a short-lived political party led by Henry Clay and John Quincy Adams. When preceded by "Liberal", this word names a splinter party that nominated Horace Greeley for president. Most commonly, this word names a party founded in Ripon, Wisconsin. Ben Wade, Thaddeus Stevens, and Charles Sumner adopted tough stances on reconstruction that made them "radical" members of this party. For the point, name this American political party, the rivals of the Democrats.
ANSWER: Republican Party [or Grand Old Party; or GOP]

26. One of this nation's colonies gained independence under the leadership of Samora Machel. The Alvor Agreement ended another conflict between this nation and its former colony of Angola. Operation Vijay succeeded in conquering one of this nation's overseas territories, the exclave of Goa, and this country gave up its colonies after the failure of the Estado Novo. For the point, name this European country once ruled by Antonio Salazar.
ANSWER: Portugal

For the point, name this king of England, the father of John and Richard the Lionheart and husband of Eleanor of Aquitaine.

29. After becoming a republican through his friendship with Baron Severino Cassio, this man fell out of political favor when he refused to wear a page uniform to serve the son of Charles Felix. This politician briefly resigned after the Peace of Villafranca, but returned and gave up Nice and Savoy to retain French support, which had been secured by the 1858 Treaty of Plombieres. For the point, name this Piedmontese statesman and first Prime Minister of a unified Italy. ANSWER: Camillo Paolo Filippo Giulio Benso, count di Cavour [accept either underlined portion]
