1. This ruler defeated the Shardana pirates and captured the vassal state of Amurru and the port of Sumur before his campaign against Muwatalli II. This man commissioned his mortuary temple in Thebes and a pair of temples that were relocated in 1968 to accommodate the Aswan High Dam. This husband of Nefertari won the battle of Kadesh against the Hittites, the opponent of his father, Seti I. For 10 points, name this long-ruling New Kingdom Egyptian pharaoh who built Abu Simbel.

ANSWER: <u>Ramesses the Great</u> [or <u>Ramesses II</u>; accept <u>Ramses</u> in place of Ramesses] [Bee]

2. A tribe in this region described as "curly haired" were known as the Silures. Tacitus published a long history of a governor of this region who won the Battle of Mons Graupius. That man, Agricola, fought tribes in this region's area of Caledonia. A structure built in this region was possibly meant to keep out the Picts and has "broad and "narrow" portions. For 10 points, name this province, the location of Hadrian's Wall.

ANSWER: Roman <u>Britain</u> [or Great <u>Britain</u>; or <u>Britannia</u>; accept <u>Wales</u> before "Caledonia"; do not accept "England" or "the United Kingdom"] [Puma]

3. After a series of competitions in this sport, two sides engaged in mutual popular boycott after controversy over the Adelaide leak and the bodyline tactic. That tactic neutralized the prowess of one of the greatest athletes to play this sport, Don Bradman, and was part of The Ashes series between England and Australia. This sport has Twenty20, One Day International, and Test varieties. For 10 points, name this sport popular in the British Commonwealth that uses a flat bat and wickets.

ANSWER: <u>cricket</u> [Patrick Liao]

4. In the Tummal inscription, this character and his son rebuild a sanctuary to the goddess Ninlil. In another appearance, he hears counsel about the fool being given chaff and about a three-ply rope not being easily broken. This character meets Siduri after mourning a friend for seven days and travels to see the flood survivor Utnapishtim. He defeats Humbaba in a cedar forest with the help of his companion, a former wild-man named Enkidu. For 10 points, name this king of Uruk, the hero of a namesake epic.

ANSWER: Gilgamesh [or Bilgames]

5. This Nobel Prize winning-scientist assisted Germany's production of chlorine gas and oversaw its use at Second Ypres. This Jewish scientist's lab ironically developed the predecessor to Zyklon B. This is the alphabetically-latter of the two namesakes of a process utilizing Hess' Law to calculate lattice energies. While working for BASF, Carl Bosch refined a process named for this man. For 10 points, name this developer of the industrial process of ammonia production. ANSWER: Fritz Haber

6. Its not Italy, but revanchists in this nation supported a cross-border raid called the Pork mutiny, and this nation's army would commonly surround troops in pockets called *motti*. One invasion of this nation attempted to split it in half by moving through Raate Road. A sniper known as the White Death fought in one of this nation's wars, which began after troops attacked the Mannerheim Line. For 10 points, name this nation that resisted a Soviet invasion in the Winter and Continuation Wars.

ANSWER: Republic of **<u>Finland</u>** [or <u>Suomi</u>] [Eric Mukherjee]

7. This organization implemented a free breakfast for children program along with community health clinics in attempts to expand outside of Oakland. The FBI infiltrated this group through the COINTELPRO program, and this group used open carry laws to counter police brutality. This group also resisted the draft by ambushing police. For 10 points, name this Maoist radical-left organization founded by Huey Newton and Bobby Seale.

ANSWER: <u>Black Panther</u> Party for Self-Defense [or <u>BPP</u>] [Zihan Zheng]

8. This rebellion ended when Captain Thomas Grantham tricked its last group of fighters into boarding his ship. The namesake of this rebellion denounced its opponent in the "Declaration of the People" and was replaced by John Ingram after he died of dysentery. This revolt's namesake member of the House of Burgesses briefly controlled most of Virginia. For 10 points, name this 1676 rebellion against Governor William Berkeley that led to the burning of Jamestown. ANSWER: <u>**Bacon**</u>'s Rebellion [Patrick Liao]

9. This movement led to the founding of the American Tract Society and involved meetings at Gasper River and Cane Ridge. Influential figures in this movement included Barton Stone and Lyman Beecher. Charles Finney described regions of New York influenced by this movement as "burned-over districts." For 10 points, identify this period of religious revival which ultimately gave rise to the emergence of Baptism and Methodism, a movement lasting from the early to mid-nineteenth century.

ANSWER: <u>Second Great Awakening</u> [prompt on partial answers such as <u>Great Awakening</u>] [Abid Haseeb]

2015 NHB Set A Bowl Round 7 10. The oldest German one of these structures was reconstructed from the original stones in 1961. Many ancient forms of these buildings contain zodiac art, such as the one at Beth Alpha near Gilboa. All of these buildings contain a platform called a *bimah* or *tebah* for resting a certain text. Since 1970, many American ones have inserted optional *mechitza* walls to separate the sexes and all have an ark area that faces Jerusalem. For 10 points, name these buildings used for Jewish religious services.

Answer: **<u>synagogue</u>**s [or <u>beth knesset</u>; or <u>beth t'fila</u>; or <u>shul</u>; or <u>esnoga</u>; or <u>kahal</u>] [Douglas Graebner]

1. In 1965 this institution was the site of LBJ's speech titled "To Fulfill these Rights." Notable figures associated with this institution include sociologist E. Franklin Frazier and philosopher Alain Locke. Named for a Union General that served as Commissioner of the Freedmen's Bureau, its Metro stop is in the Shaw neighborhood. For 10 points, name this historically black university located in Washington, DC.

ANSWER: **<u>Howard</u>** University

BONUS: This other historically black school located in Atlanta employed Howard Zinn as a faculty member and exclusively admits women.

ANSWER: Spelman College

2. One leader of this nation was removed in the People Power Revolution, also known as the Yellow Revolution, following the assassination of Benigno Aquino. General Wainwright surrendered this present day nation to the Japanese while besieged in Corregidor. For 10 points, name this country where American troops experienced the Bataan Death March.

ANSWER: Republic of the **Philippines** or [Republika ng **Pilipinas**]

BONUS: The wife of Philippine dictator Ferdinand Marcos, Imelda Marcos, was known for owning a large number of this article of clothing.

ANSWER: <u>shoe</u>s [accept reasonable equivalents] [Jason Zhou]

3. The name of one of this man's works was inspired by a display at the Columbian Exposition in Chicago involving the lowering of the Liberty Bell. Another of his compositions was often used to accompany the two-step and was commissioned by its namesake newspaper, the *Washington Post*. For 10 points, name this composer of *The Stars and Stripes Forever* and many other marches.

ANSWER: John Philip Sousa

BONUS: At the request of Chester Alan Arthur, Sousa composed "Semper Fidelis", which became the official march of this organization.

ANSWER: the United States <u>Marine Corps</u> [or the <u>Marine</u>s; or the <u>USMC</u>] [Rob Carson]

4. This leader was sent to the Canary islands after the rise of the Popular Front and was a leader of the Foreign Legion during the Rif War. This leader is buried in the Valley of the Fallen, a monument which was built under his rule. This leader joined his Falange party to the Carlists. For 10 points, name this Fascist leader of Spain who won the Spanish Civil War. ANSWER: Francisco Franco [or Francisco Franco Bahamonde] BONUS: Franco was supported in the Spanish Civil War by this air unit, which bombed Guernica. It was mainly composed of volunteers from Luftwaffe. ANSWER: Condor Legion [or Legion Condor]

5. Louisiana native Willie Francis sued E. L. Resweber to prevent this action, on the grounds that it had already been unsuccessfully applied to him. *Roper v. Simmons* placed age restrictions on this action. A set of 1976 cases that held that this action could never be mandatory, but overturned a moratorium on performing it, included *Gregg v. Bonus: This state was the respondent in *Atkins*, a Supreme Court case prohibiting a capital sentence for mentally handicapped individuals. *Pace v. Alabama* was overturned in a 1966 case challenging this state's anti-miscegenation laws.

ANSWER: Commonwealth of Virginia

ANSWER: Republic of <u>Honduras</u> [Republica de <u>Honduras</u>]

BONUS: Manuel Zelaya was criticized for allying with the leader of what country currently experiencing runaway inflation and rioting and led by the PSUV Party? ANSWER: Bolivarian Republic of **Venezuela** [or Republica Bolivariana de **Venezuela**]

The Treaty of (*) Waitangi was a controversial land document in, for 10 points, what island country in the southwest Pacific whose capital is Wellington?</u>

6. <u>In 2007, this country's military dictator suspended the chief justice of its supreme court</u> <u>and declared a state of emergency before resigning the next year. This country's president</u> <u>Pervez</u> (+) Musharraf seized power in a coup in 1999 soon after the indecisive (+) Kargil War. In this country's most recent elections, cricketer Imran Khan's political party finished in second place.
